



Beautiful weather brought out a great crowd to this annual event and neighbors were able to clear out some clutter or bring home new treasures!







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




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# FOREST HILL PARK HAPPENINGS

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# MESSAGE FROM KRISTEN LARSON

Fourth District City Council Member

ear Friends and Neighbors of Westover Hills Neighborhood, I hope everyone is healthy and well and had a great summer. Thank you to everyone who took the time to stop in to my ice cream social in June. It was great to see so many familiar faces and meet some new neighbors. I hope to hold an in-person district meeting in September/October so please look for those details via my e-newsletter or Facebook page.

In legislative news, City Council has been working with Richmond Police Department to update the city's noise ordinance. The way our existing law is written, it's extremely hard to enforce and our police officers have struggled over the years with using it as an effective tool. After many months of work, a new piece of legislation has come forward for City Council's consideration. At our last Government Operations meeting, I asked if the new proposed law would give police officers the ability to enforce noise violations at our city parks. Over the years my office has received multiple calls related to loud music and cars in our 4th district city parks. The city administration will be coming back to our September 28th Government Operations meeting with possible amendments/information related to public park noise violations. Public comment is welcome at this meeting (virtually or in-person). Please contact my office for more details.

I have exciting news that the Huguenot Flatwater universal access construction project is complete and formally reopened in late July. The project was spearheaded by non-profit James River Outdoor Coalition (JROC) in collaboration with the city. JROC sought out several private grants and the city contributed tax-payer funds to help fully fund the project. I am so grateful for the hard work of

JROC members and Richmond's Department of Parks & Recreation. This new access ramp will add a second ADA compliant access point for paddlers with disabilities. The other one is located in the middle at Reedy Creek. The new universal access ramp at Flatwater will connect the upper 4 miles of James River with ADA compliant access at both ends. Paddlers of all abilities will have access to a calmer section of the James and be able to paddle downriver to Reedy Creek with its accessible takeout. Hope to see you there soon!

Please continue to protect yourself and others from COVID-19 by vaccinating when eligible and taking the proper safety precautions. Information on vaccination and testing appointments is easily accessible on the Richmond City Health District's COVID-19 webpage(vax.rchd.com).

As always, you can stay up-to-date on 4th district meetings, announcements, and events, by subscribing to my e-newsletter. Congratulations to former fourth district liaison Aaron Bond on his new job with the City of Richmond in the planning department. 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# "Richmond's Most Beautiful Suburb": The Selling of Westover Hills

"WESTOVER HILLS 'Richmond's Most Beautiful Suburb" is the title of the familiar 1935 promotional booklet that the Westover Hills Neighborhood Association reprinted for distribution to new residents. In florid language, the booklet extols the virtues that still attract people to the neighborhood: natural beauty; clean air and a healthy environment; proximity to the James River and area parks; the views of and from Riverside Drive; easy access to downtown; architectural diversity; stable property values; and genuine neighborliness.

The Richmond into which Westover Hills was born was in the midst of a business and real estate boom. The city in 1920 had a population of 172,000. Annexation of the independent city of Manchester in 1910 and of territory from neighboring Henrico and Chesterfield in 1906, 1910, and 1914 had quadrupled the city's landmass and doubled its population. The city swallowed such new neighborhoods as Forest Hill and Ginter Park, Bellevue Park, Laburnum Park, and Bryan Park were opening up and Windsor Farms was on the drawing boards.

The Westover Hills Corporation was chartered in 1922, as was the subsidiary Boulevard Bridge Corporation. Both were controlled by the John Stewart Bryan family, which also owned extensive railroad interests as well as the Richmond Times-Dispatch and the Richmond News Leader. Working through

intermediaries, the Westover Hills Corporation had "acquired several large parcels of land in Chesterfield County just west of the city corporation limits which a promoter later described as "the great South Side tract that for years escaped the vision of city planners and realty men".

"Richmond may have a new subdivision as a result of a real estate deal which became known yesterday," the Times-Dispatch announced in October 1919. "The Granite Land Company has conveyed to Judge Daniel Grinnan its tract of land on the South Side, which is situated on the James River at the point where it is crossed by the Belt Line bridges.... Judge Grinnan is said to hold the title for others, who will form a company and develop the property."

That development company, the Westover Hills Corporation [WHC], acquired the land, and worked

through the Bryan-owned Laburnum Realty Corporation, English-born South Richmond realtor Arthur L. Adamson (1856-1944), and realtor James E. Donahue to sell the lots. The Boulevard Bridge Corporation negotiated with the city to build a bridge over the James River that would connect the new neighborhood to Byrd Park and the city. Completion of the bridge in January 1925 (the subject of a future article) and securing authorization to connect to city water lines in April 1925 were critical to the neighborhood's commercial success.

The Westover Hills Corporation began site preparation in 1923, cutting and paving roads and installing water, lights, sewers, and sidewalks as it developed five subdivisions identified on the plat map. The WHC opened the first section for sale in November 1923, and reported the sale of 103 lots in the first week. A year later, after three sections had been opened, a Laburnum Realty official said that the Sunday traffic along Riverside Drive "resembles the gold rush of '49."

Agents attributed the brisk sales in part to the barrage of advertisements and promotional articles published in the



friendly Times-Dispatch. The mid-1920s ads coupled simple stylized drawings of the neighborhood's bucolic landscape and features (Riverside Drive, the Boulevard Bridge, or the recently completed Atlantic Coast Line bridge) with vivid word pictures of life in the new subdivision. On December 30, 1923:

"Westover Hills' / Richmond's most beautiful suburb. Located opposite Byrd Park, and will be connected with the Park by the new Boulevard Bridge (now under construction).

"Do you like to see the trees in Springtime budding?

"Do you like to hear the rippling river's rills?

"Do you like to live clear days with sunshine flooding?

"All these and more are at 'Westover Hills."

Two weeks later, Times-Dispatch readers learned that Westover Hills was not only "Richmond's most beautiful suburb," but also "A place where life is worth living."

The prose in some of the ads must have seemed a bit comical even then. From April 11, 1929:

"Two Little Children / A year ago lived on a crowded city street. They were pale – the doctor came often / Now: / They have rosy cheeks / There are few doctors' bills / Because / They play in Nature's pure, fresh air – among the trees at / WESTOVER HILLS / Richmond's Most Beautiful Suburb"

"Approach....," beckoned an April 14, 1929 ad showing a roadster passing under the arches of the new railroad bridge toward an impressive house on a hill. "Across the winding James, rockstrewn, where white arches are etched against the purple reaches of the sky, through stretches of woodland...pines, tall oaks, elms....that is the way to Westover Hills – an approach justified by the dignity of the homes already erected there."

#### A HISTORICAL VIEW

This is the first installment in a serialized history commemorating the centennial of Westover Hills. The generally chronological articles will cover such topics as first residents, racial segregation, annexation, and the Boulevard Bridge. These articles are not meant to be the final word, but only a stage in compiling a fuller neighborhood history. "Beautiful trees" – dogwoods in spring, fall colors in the autumn – became a favorite theme. During the Depression when, a WHC official recalled decades later, "we couldn't give the lots away," the prose became at once more purple and more practical. By 1937, Westover Hills had become "Tidewater's Most Scenic Spot in 'Richmond's Most Beautiful Suburb'."

Beyond the natural beauty, according to a May 31, 1936 ad, Westover Hills provided the advantages of "Fresh, country air, just right for children's playground and free from dangers of heavy traffic...." And it provided "Three Essentials for Home Happiness / \* A **BEAUTIFUL SETTING** \* ATTRACTIVE **NEIGHBORS /\* ALL** CONVENIENCES." (June 25, 1939).

The selling of Westover Hills in the 1920s and 1930s emphasized the features that still make the neighborhood popular today. But not everyone was allowed to enjoy those features. A 1923 promotional article employed careful, but well-understood euphemisms to assure potential buyers that Westover Hills was an "exclusive residential district" that was "protected by carefully drawn restrictions." As in most other such neighborhoods in Richmond and in much of the nation, restrictive covenants prevented African-Americans from buying property there (the subject for another future article).

And, as fond as we residents are of Westover Hills, humility and perspective compel us to acknowledge that ours was not the only beautiful and desirable Richmond neighborhood on the market in the 1920s. In February 1923 (ten months before Laburnum's first ads for Westover Hills), an advertisement touted lots in "Richmond's Most Beautiful Suburb" – Bellevue Park.

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

# It's leaf collection time!

With the leaves beginning to fall, it's time to remind neighbors of some important leaf collection facts.

Leaf collection and disposal is the responsibility of city residents. We are also responsible for cleaning up sidewalks, ditches and parking lanes, whether you collect them by bagging, mulching, composting, city leaf vacuum service or through a private lawn service. Please urge lawn services to remove the leaves from your property themselves, rather than leaving in the gutters. There is no automatic City pickup any longer.

If bagging your own leaves, please use compostable bags and leave them next to your trash cans. Leaf vacuum service is available for a \$30 fee. The City also reminds citizens to rake up to their property line, NOT into the gutter.

#### October 4

Leaf collection begins up to 10 bags on trash day will be picked up

#### **November 1**

Leaf vacuum service starts

#### December 14-31

Unlimited bags of leaves will be picked up with trash.
