



Monthly Meeting Minutes – September 12, 2023 Location – Westover Hills United Methodist Church Sanctuary

Opening

WelcomeFran Eckenrode and Tom Tichenor Tom opened the meeting at 7:05 pm and thanked Kristen and Timmy for their work to organize a very nice event for Neighbor's Night Out.

Guest Reports

Police Department UpdateLt. Andorfer

Lt Andorfer updated recent crime stats for our neighborhood. Only 2 crimes were reported including a shoplifting at CVS and 1 auto larceny. This compares to 3 major crimes last year. Two car types are still at-risk for theft including Kia & Hyundai. Lt. Andorfer recommended to put a visible deterrent on your car. Best option is a steering wheel lock. Non-visible deterrents do not prevent thiefs from breaking the window and tearing your car apart. Richmond Police Dept gave away 500 locks. If you want one, reach out and see if there are any left. They cost only \$30-40. Kristen Nye had 2 with her at the meeting. A car thief was recently arrested on Stoney Pt Parkway. Four other thiefs were identified. They lived all over the city. Car thefts have dropped since these arrests. One16 yr old was linked to many other crimes including firearms and violent felonies.

Lt Andorfer let us know about a "Coffee with Cop" event on Oct 4 at Tablespoons from 10-noon. Promotional info will be coming.

STR's and ADU's. City council in process of considering of considering legislation on these. An ADU is like in-law suite. Can be separate from house: a renovated basement with kitchen, above a garage, etc. Right now If you want to make an ADU there is a cumbersome process to get a special use permit. Legislation being considered is to allow people to create ADU's within specified limits.

An ADU can only take up certain amount of lot space. The city wants the ADU process to be less difficult because the city has a housing shortage and rents are high. This legislation would create more housing within existing housing. ADU's must comply with regular building codes and still must be permitted. May be no more than 1/3 of square footage of main residence. An incidence was mentioned of a small trailer brought in as short term rental. This is not legal. An ADU cannot be mobile. Must be a permanent structure. The proposed new rules go to planning next week and, if approved, goes to council for approval.

STR's short term rentals. The legislation will address some problems with STR's. STR's must be your primary residence to run a short term rental out of your house. STR is 30 days. Spirit of new rules is to keep these requirements. There are fewer than 5 B&B's in area and no reported problems. Tightening legislation is to help with enforcement. Must be registering STR with city and pay lodging tax to city. Must be an owner-occupied property and property must be permitted.

Bike lanes. City and WHNA (and other partners) had a meeting in May and survey at same time. Folks in transit dept have taken input and are working on final design. Question: Can we see results from city survey? Kristen will follow up. The ongoing neighborhood survey is separate from city and WHNA.

The City passed a financing tool for developers to renovate buildings in energy efficient ways. The BoA developers will use this financing tool. There will be a publicized event on this.

A Liter pick up is scheduled this sat at 8:30 at Roanoke and Dunston near Reedy Creek.

School Board ReportJonathan Young

Jon reported several "wins" for student, which are wins for the neighborhood. One of Jon's objectives is to have yr round schools. Richmond now has 3 elementary schools going year round. 200 days a yr in place of 180. Another win: effective January, 5 secondary schools are piloting an initiative to limit access to cell phones during day. Another win is about school choice: Maggie Walker and some other schools require admissions. Want to increase access to these schools by increasing seats.

There was a question regarding students not having access to warnings that come on cell phones for weather, violence, etc. Jon response: the every-day threat is bullying and rumors on social media. Limiting phone access is a trade-off.

Jon commented that police are achieving some results for student safety. The same evening as the Altria graduation shooting, an arrest was made at Geo. Wythe High School where a number of students had threatened to shoot another student.

At 8:25 first runner will be in neighborhood Electronic signs will be used to close the bridge for that time. About 2500 runners are expected the first year.
